Aloha! We have eight classmates, plus spouses and friends (shown below) already signed up for the AHS Class of '59 Hawaii Cruise. We hope you will join us on this 15-night Cruise and see the country's 50th state (since August 21, 1959) up close and personal. Visit the Pearl Harbor USS Arizona Memorial, the Punchbowl Cemetery, the Hawaiian Cultural Center, and the North Shore of Oahu. Take a glass-bottom boat, check out the waterfalls on the big island, go on a scuba dive (Kona, Hawaii), check out the volcanoes on the other side (Hilo, Hawaii), attend a luau on Ka'anapali Beach on Maui, zip along the tree line, or just walk along the beaches. There is plenty for everyone's interest and budget. We have had classmates who are thinking about sharing a cabin. Let me know if you might have a similar interest.

The specific numbered rooms that we had reserved have expired, but there is still space on the same, or other decks. We had initially held space for 18 staterooms. 




