gladness, some successes and some disappointments. Regardless, the experience will be remembered 'til I can't remember any more. The golf, the bus trip, reacquainting

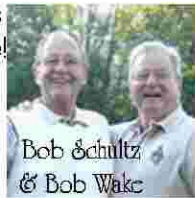

HOW TO SHRINK DIGITAL PHOTOS FOR EMAIL OR WEB

Today's digital cameras produce large images, on average 5-6 mega pixels or 2-3 megabytes (MB) in size. These images are too big for sending by email or for publishing on web. If you are sending photos, for example, of your family to your relatives you should shrink those images to 1 mega pixel or less (size up to 1024x768 pixels and file size around 100 KB). That is the appropriate size for email. You would not want to receive 10-20 MB of large photos in your mailbox, especially if you are not on broadband.

There is a simple free utility from Microsoft for Windows XP called *Image Resizer PowerToy* that will help you shrink digital photos with few mouse clicks. To get this FREE utility got to: www.MyTechGuide.com. Part way down the page is the article for this topic. After reading the article if you need help, let me know. 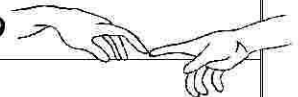
So, how come you didn't tell me?

JOHN & BEV TORRENS, (Petaluma, CA) sent us this note: We recently were in Iowa to participate in the annual bike ride across the state. While on the way home, we wanted to see the famous painted rock where a young man spends three weeks each May painting different scenes on the four faces of the 50 ton boulder honoring our military and what

they have done over the years to keep us free and safe. He has done this annually for the last 7 years. I'm sure you have seen pictures of the rock on the internet.

We found the rock with no trouble and I have to tell you that it brought a tear to my eye to see that it has become somewhat of a shrine.

There was a newspaper article under glass near the boulder that said that for years, this rock was once used by the local kids who painted graffiti all over it. Since the young man has started to paint it, only once has someone defaced the rock with graffiti. A local Vietnam Vet investigated, found out who did it, found the local kid, and beat the crap out of him.

The Vet was arrested and found guilty of beating up a vandal,

which is not a serious crime in Iowa. He was fined \$90, which included court costs. The members of the local VFW chipped in and paid his fine.

Another posted story was that the painter said he was going to stop painting the rock after the 3rd year. Bear in mind, painting the rock takes three to four weeks and he often works under floodlights late into the night. He lives locally in Greenfield, Iowa and he got a call one night from the guys at an American Legion Post in Colorado.
