On the way to San Diego, our embarkation port, Kathy and I stopped to see Gary and Ann (Carlisle) Garnett in Sun City West. Everyone else flew, but I really like the way Western

Oklahoma, Northern Texas and Eastern New Mexico look (my rider says, "Never again!"). Really a scenic area....if you like flat, brown, and rock with picnic areas with NO facilities. Before dinner on Nov 4, Gary made an incredible guacamole dip to go with some Deer Creek wine. Ann made dinner for us and the Garrs (Roy and Cathy) and Gary's Mom. After replacing a tire the next morning, we continued on to San Diego. Coming down off the mountain into Yuma, AZ, I met another very nice law enforcement officer. Another warning ticket—guess I am one up on Nancy Snell now.

The Cruise was scheduled to embark on Nov 6, but the prior cruise had a medical emergency and lost a day, as they had to turn back to their last port. That caused a new itinerary for us with financial consideration for losing the first day and the overnight in Honolulu. We were notified of the change and all kept their original plans and saw some of San Diego with our extra day. Almost all of us toured the USS Midway, an aircraft museum near the port. That evening (Nov 6) Betty and Susan had arrived in time for dinner with the rest of us at the Fish Market restaurant about a block or two away from the Port. Carol (Conroy) Zanio and her husband drove down and had dinner with us. All of us had stayed at the Holiday Inn right across the street from the port and so we used their shuttle service to the ship. Almost all had boarded in time for lunch and we headed out to Hawaii just before dinner. Later, we learned that Doug and Anna Marie's luggage was still at the Holiday Inn. They had checked it while on a Trolley ride of the city. The next few days were spent at sea with lots of great entertainment (a comedian, a ventriloguist, and an elaborate show by the Celebrity Singers/Dancers), bingo, trivia, Sudoku, karaoke, computer classes, lei making and movies, etc.

On the morning of Nov 11, we saw Oahu approaching. It takes awhile at 20 knots to get us into port from first land sighting. That morning, there had been a special Veteran's reception held in honor of all the Veterans on board. As part of our new itinerary, we knew that we would arrive too late to get to the Arizona Memorial. A plan was put together by Celebrity for the Veterans, with the cooperation of the US Navy, to take 150 people to the memorial. A priority list was agreed to by the vets with the following order...Pearl Harbor Vets, WW II Vets, Korea Vets and the balance by lottery. Bill and Doug were selected, I was not. Most of us took a three-to-four-hour tour of the Pearl Harbor Museum (w/o the AZ Memorial itself), Punchbowl National Cemetery, and sightseeing of the Island and Honolulu. The Luau that was cancelled the night before was changed to the ship itself. The Yates finally got their luggage and guickly dressed in swim gear, took a cab to Waikiki Beach, jumped in the water and then came back to the ship. The next morning we were at Kailua-Kona on the big Island of Hawaii. We took the tenders to shore and took excursions, which included an Atlantis Submarine (120 ft down to see the fish and coral), a Hawaiian outrigger adventure, and Highlights of Kona including a coffee plantation. We headed off to Hilo that evening.

Our Cruise had our own medical emergency that evening on the ship and we sped straight to Hilo so the 81-year-old man could get emergency medical treatment. As a result, we did not do the 360-degree turn while going by Mt Kilauea (an active volcano). The red glow was still somewhat visible from a distance.

At Hilo, on the other side of the Island, most of us went on some excursion that included a trip to Volcanoes National Park, a lava tube, and the Mauna Loa Macadamia Nut Factory. Then we were off to Lahaina, Maui.

On Maui, we went to Maui Tropical Plantation and the Iao Valley State Park. Some went to the Ocean Center and one couple went snorkeling. That evening, our cruise director announced that a new entertainer had boarded the ship, a singer from the UK named Helen Javne. She is the same entertainer that was aboard the Galaxy when we went to the Panama Canal. She did similar shows to the ones we saw there and got rave reviews, at least from me. Then it was time to head back to the Continental US. On the way back, we had unusually smooth water and did many of the same things we did at sea going to Hawaii. This time Marlene Neurauter finally won a bingo game, just a couple hundred dollars, not an upgrade. Ed Wahl helped finish a 1000 piece jigsaw puzzle, and Marcia (Born) Schacht celebrated a birthday and told us she is going to get married. Our last port was a stop in Ensenada, Mexico for several hours to satisfy the Jones Law that foreign registered ships cannot cruise the US ports without a foreign stop. We took a tour of the city at night and then attended a Mexican Fiesta. Marlene had a painful tooth problem and got a doctor's advice and a prescription for a whopping \$8 in Ensenada. Then we got back to San Diego the following morning Nov 21 and disembarked.

Kathy and I took the Trolley ride all over San Diego and saw the city, as we were not leaving until the following morning. Doug & Anna MarieYates, Marcia (Born) Schacht and her fiancé, Tom, stayed also.

For the most part, the ocean was very cooperative as the waves were very nice to us—in fact, two of the days were as smooth as glass, only one time did I feel a lot of movement and that was in the Theatre at night. Overall, it was probably less choppy than the Panama Canal Cruise. This cruise was an older crowd with a lot of wheel chairs and canes. The group discussed what we do next and when. Some of the group seemed ready to go again as early as the 2nd quarter of 2009. I will have another questionnaire out soon to determine future interests and timing. Looking forward to the next Cruise soon!
